This was the second generation of the front-wheel drive Eldorado. The heavily sculptured body styling this year had the addition of fender skirts for the Eldorado. The large rear bumper had vertical wrap-around tail lights. Though it was just $\frac{1}{2}$ inch longer overall than the previous year's model, it looked far bulkier. Six inches had been added between the wheel centers but the overall length increased just $\frac{1}{2}$ in. Most of the additional length was added to the front section of the car.

Fender skirts harkened back to the 1950s and projected a classical image, as did revival of the convertible. Rear coil springs were a new feature. Fleetwood wreaths were featured on the hood and deck and Eldorado script was on the lower front fenders. The hood had a stand-up hood ornament.

A less-than-enthusiastic writer in *Automobile Quarterly* said "there is absolutely no logical reason for owning this Eldorado. In terms of efficiency it ranks somewhere near zero...in terms of handling, it is a barge compared with the very nice car it was six years ago. It also has the thirstiest engine in production." Options included rear window defogger (\$37), automatic climate control (\$537), Soft Ray tinted glass (\$59), shoulder belts in the convertible front or rear seat (\$32), and tilt and telescope steering wheel (\$95).

The American public, however, was impressed. It was just what the luxury market wanted in the self-indulgent 1970's. GM recorded a sizable production gain through 1973 when the energy crisis started.
